

Criminal Justice - Law Enforcement, BA/BS

Program Description

Utah Tech's Criminal Justice major is an interdisciplinary program that combines the study of criminal law, law enforcement, and criminology, providing a firm foundation for a myriad of careers. This course of study exposes students to the interconnected nature of the criminal justice system and explores criminological explanations for crime commission. Graduates from this program are prepared to enter applied positions in the criminal justice system or pursue graduate degrees in law, criminology, sociology, forensics psychology, etc. The law enforcement emphasis is comprised of 45 total credits. The core requires students to take courses in criminal justice, philosophy, technical writing, communications, and social/behavioral science. In addition to the established core curriculum, students will take courses in the following areas: social and behavioral sciences; ethical communication; and policy and practice. This emphasis prepares students to enter the field of law enforcement with skills that supplement the training cadets receive in the law enforcement academy.

- Receive 16 transfer credits for GEFL 1000 (8) and GEFL 2000 (8) in a single foreign language (grade C or higher)

OR

Complete a 1010 course listed below in a second foreign language (grade C or higher) AND one of the following:

1. In a language not taught at Utah Tech, receive 12 FLATS exam credits for FLAT 1000 (8) and FLAT 2000 (4)
or
2. In a language not taught at Utah Tech, receive 12 transfer credits articulated as GEFL 1000 (8) and GEFL 2000 (4) (all grade C or higher)

OR

Available only to students who are nonnative English speakers, complete one of the following:

- Complete 16 credits of ESL courses listed below (grade B or higher)
- Complete ESL 2750 or ESL 2760 (grade B or higher).

- Submit one of the following test scores required for unconditional Utah Tech admission: TOEFL (61 iBT, 173 CBT, or 500 PBT); or Michigan (70); or USU-IELE equivalent score. Other tests may be accepted for admission to Utah Tech but will not fulfill this requirement. Official scores must be submitted to the Registrar's Office.

1. Describe the major components of the Criminal Justice system and the fundamental processes that take place therein
2. Compare primary criminological theories and their respective causal arguments.
3. Apply correct criminological theory to address criminal behavior, crime trends, or criminal justice police/practice.
4. Differentiate basic methodological techniques employed in past and current criminological research.
5. Appraise research that illuminates the strengths and weaknesses of current criminal justice policy or research that attempts to reveal the causes of criminal behavior.
6. Apply appropriate research methods to analyze varying criminal behaviors or functions within the Criminal Justice system.
